Ava recognized that many Latinos/as do not seek out behavioral health treatment due to stigma surrounding mental health. The Latinos/as that do seek mental health treatment often struggle remaining in treatment due to poor therapeutic alliance, among other things. For her project, she has been trying to understand treatment seeking behaviors among Latinx clients as well as best practices for providers and interpreters involved in behavioral health treatment. This research is being used to create a guide for mental health organizations with the hopes of increasing and maintaining participation from Latinx clients.
